A TALE OF A LIVERPOOL LASS

It was Bernard (Brad's) fault that it all started. My friend Val and I used to go to the Locarno Ballroom, every Saturday night, in Liverpool's City centre. Val and I used to meet up with friends there to dance and jive and it was there that we met Brad who was in the RAF stationed at West Kirby on the Wirral. One Saturday Brad told me that he was being posted to Ceylon and asked if I would write to him so I gave him my address. When Brad arrived in Ceylon he wrote and asked if I would ask the girls I worked with in the offices of Hartley's Jam factory if they would be willing to write to some of his contemporaries. The girl's wrote a short note about themselves with their names and addresses c/o of Brad who put them into a hat for a 'lucky dip' but he gave my letter to a friend named Ron.

In my introductory letter I had written I was looking for somebody with a sense of humour, tall dark and handsome like Dirk Bogarde! I had enclosed a photo of myself as well. In Ron's first letter he described himself as the monster from the Blue Lagoon, very hairy and very sarcastic, at times. He also enclosed a photo and I thought "very dishy". Ron was 5'8" tall and I was 5'7" so a perfect fit. (I thought It would be a novelty to dance



with someone of my own height). I replied to Ron saying that I could also be sarcastic but not hairy.

Ron had completed two years National Service and had enlisted for a further two. He said he was "enjoying the good life with all his washing, cooking and cleaning done for for him and being thoroughly spoiled.

In a later letter he wrote that a film crew had arrived to make a film called Bridge over the River Kwai and the service personnel were enlisted as 'extras' – they could not be paid but would be given cigarettes. A proud Ron described the opening scene. "The train comes along the track, stops and the guards get down followed by the prisoners. They walk alongside the track for a while and start going up a hill and as they come over the brow he was the second one over the top". His claim to fame!

Back in Liverpool all the girls went to see the film and we all sat watching and counting then shouted "there's Ron" Startled and embarrassed faces all round!

We met for the first time on 15th September. Ron was on disembarkation leave and was coming on a visit arriving at Liverpool's Lime Street Station. "How will I know you?" I wrote. His response was "Look for a bloke carrying a guitar case". (No standing underneath the station clock for us!) Just when I was beginning to think he had changed his mind I spotted him and thought to myself mmm OK. So we left the station and walked to the bus stop to my parents house.



We were some of the lucky ones Moffatt Road, where the family lived, had not had the heavy bombing that much of Liverpool had been subjected to although all of one side of the road was an air raid shelter which the Corporation demolished some years later.

We lived in a typical two up two down terraced house, no front of back gardens for us with a toilet in the backyard. Mum had bought a bed settee for the visit as my two brothers slept in the back bedroom. Mum and Dad was in the front bedroom, on a really tall double bed and I slept on what was call a truckle bed which was on the floor at the end of their bed.

When Mum and Dad came home from work we had a cup of tea and sat and talked with them and I kept surreptitiously glancing at Ron and

thinking "I'm not sure I like him" and when his arm crept along the back of the settee towards me I inched away. The tension was eased when Ron suggested a visit to the cinema and whilst we were watching the film his arm once again slid along the back of my seat but on this occasion I let is stay and thought "This is not so bad after all!"

The visit flew by and Ron had to return to London to be demobbed. From then on I would travel to London, on the overnight coach, one weekend and he would travel to Liverpool on alternate weekends on the train. Our correspondence continued throughout the weeks between visits.

Ron loved his music and his favourite song was Johnnie by Johnnie Ray (Ironically, as it turned out the lyrics ran "Johnnie remember me"). I received a letter from Ron to say he was going to try and make a career singing so he was going to concentrated on that. I was broken hearted and my Mum and Aunt said he was never to darken their doors again. "Fat chance" I thought.

Some time later I received a letter from Ron's brother Len asking me to take Ron back as he was "walking around like a bear with a sore head". I told Len that Ron could write to me again. Ron wrote asking me to move to London and said that I could live with his Mum and Dad in Forest Gate where I would have my own room. My Mum and Dad agreed and the "in-laws' were very kind and accepted me as the daughter they had never had.

I took employment with a printing company at Kings Cross and Ron and I frequented the cinemas and theatres quite regularly. One day we went into town to visit the cinema but first Ron took me to Lyons Corner House at the Strand where they had a string quartet playing. He had reserved at table on a little balcony and as we sat eating the string quartet started walking towards us still playing and Ron put a small box on the table and proposed. I said yes and opened the box to find it was empty!

We went to the Cinema to watch the preview of the film Campbell's Kingdom and Ron gave me a box of chocolates that he insisted I open right away and nestled in a depression where a chocolate had been, was a beautiful engagement ring. Unfortunately, it only fitted onto his little finger to the first joint so it did not fit me. The jeweller agreed to take it back and a different ring was purchased.

I wrote to Mum and Dad when we got home to give them the news and Mum and my Aunt came to visit us on my birthday on 21st October. Obviously, the first question was "When is the wedding?" Ron laughed and said he could make it before Christmas!

Ron and I married on 20th December 1958 in the Congregational Free Church in East Ham where I changed the posh sounding surname from Kilmartin to the rather popular Smith.



I was secretary to the Director of a company when we got engaged and he had voiced his opinion that I was "far too young and hadn't lived" but he still presented us with a cut glass rose bowl as a wedding present. We found rooms to rent in a house at Hackney consisting of a living room, bedroom and scullery/kitchen. The landlady had an unusual living arrangements, her husband lived in the basement and her son lived in a downstairs room with the landlady using the rooms that were left. One day I was unable to work and stayed in bed. Ron was at work when I was roused by the door opening and thought that it was him returning. I looked up to find the landlady in the room and asked what she was doing. Rather flustered she said she had been cleaning the stairs!

Shortly after this incident Ron's brother. Len, told us they were moving from their rented accommodation in Forest Gate so we took over their rooms. Mrs Druce was a lovely landlady and she also allowed us to enjoy the small back garden.

On a visit to my home for Christmas I suddenly got very home sick and asked Ron if he would be prepared to move to Liverpool and he agreed and Ron's mother gave us the deposit to enable us to purchase our first home in Hall, Liverpool.

Ron took a position working for the Railway Police. One of the advantages of this was we were entitled to free railway passes as a result we visited Ron's parents often. Ron passed the examination to become a Police Inspector. Unfortunately, Mr Beeching had begun to swing his axe and Ron soon realised that he would never be able to take up that promotion.

Various trades were then tried, he became a Milkman before working at Courtaulds factory. Later on he heard that they were opening a new place in Chester and was he interested in moving. We sold our house in Liverpool and bought one in Chester. A short while afterwards we learned that Courtaulds were bringing their own staff so Ron left and went to work at Radio Rentals where he stayed for a year and a half prior to relocating to Suffolk.

We had our ups and downs as most couples do but we also had two loving daughters Julie and Tracy. We considered ourselves lucky and celebrated

out 40th wedding anniversary on 20 December 1998. My brother, John who lives in Canada, invited us over for the New Year. Ron didn't want to go and as our daughter, Julie, was living with us at that time it was decided that I should go alone as I hadn't seen my brother for seven years and it was his 50th birthday in January. I flew out on 27th December and was due to return on 7th January.

It was great catching up with the family and one of the highlights was going to see Niagra Falls and though I dislike heights I was persuaded to join him on the cable car that took us over to the American side which was frozen and seemed quite weird. On the return journey the cable car stopped over a whirlpool so that was a bit scary looking down upon it..

On 6th January I had a 'phone call from our daughter, Julie. She had been for an interview and arrived home to find there was no sign of Ron. She went upstairs to check the bedroom and found Ron in bed. He had suffered a massive heart attack and died in his sleep.



My brother took me to the airport and left me in a queue while he went to find someone in charge and explained the situation. On his return I was whisked to the front of the queue from there I was taken care of. I was allowed onto the aircraft first and put into first class for my trip home. Our daughter, Tracy, met me at the airport and took me home. Those of you who have lost loved ones know how life becomes a blurred, robotic world for a time until you get to a *'new'* normal life. I treasure my family and friends an have happy memories. I take pride in my five grandchildren and especially in my first great grandchild a boy named Gilby who was born on Christmas day 2019.

The Ipswich Hospital - Cardiac User Group And how it affects you!

The Ipswich Hospital Cardiac User Group is a patient lead group of users of the cardiology services (patients) at Ipswich hospital and a cross section of senior providers of the service (nurses to senior management). This group is important to you as we are able to monitor all aspects of the service from short fall in equipment to waiting times. We try to be proactive by supporting the service and where necessary confront problems. To this end the group was instrumental over many years, in getting the Heart Centre built at the Hospital. We also had members on the design committee of both the Heart centre and Critical Care Unit. Both these being critically important to Heartbeat members.

We have a very close relationship with Heartbeat East Suffok (a proportion of the committee being Heartbeat members). This has enabled us to reduce waiting times by being the conduit between the needs of the Hospital service and Heartbeats' charitable instincts, to provide hospital equipment for the hospital to improve patient experience throughout their stay. Requests by the Hospital for help can be transferred directly to the Heartbeat committee for consideration, via the Heartbeat committee members on the Cardiology User Group team.

Other areas of concern are very important to individual patients but are not so wide spread and are not always so easy to rectify. One area we have been looking into concerns patients who come into hospital for cardiac or other conditions and are placed on non-cardiac wards. These patients are often treated by doctors who are specialists in other areas and may or may not consult cardiologists on the patients treatment. In some cases patients have become distressed with the apparent separation from cardiological overview of their condition. We have, therefore, managed to arrange a method of contact with the cardiology department. This site is now up and running for patients who are worried about their medication or treatment changes whilst on non-cardiac wards. This is for *urgent need only* and should not be used for any other purpose.
